



SCOPE OF SERVICE

In addition to the regular service between Niagara and the Saguenay, the Canada Steamship Lines also operates the East-West water highway of the Great Lakes (see inset map at right) from Detroit and Windsor to Duluth calling enroute at Sarnia, Sault Ste. Marie (the Soo), and Port Arthur. This service is fully described in another booklet entitled "The Great Lakes." Blanketing over half of the Canadian border these combined services, together with the two company owned and operated Hotels-Manoir Richelieu and Hotel Tadoussac-provide many unusual travel and vacation possibilities . . . a few of which are outlined herein and fully described in booklet entitled "Fascinating Vacations on Canada's Glorious Inland Waterways."





*GENERAL INFORMATION

CHILDREN under five years, accompanied, free; children over five years and under twelve, half fare; twelve years and over, full fare.

BAGGAGE may be checked through to all points on the line, and at Toronto, Kingston. Prescott, Cornwall, Montreal, Quebec and Murray Bay customs offleers are in attendance to inspect baggage. Baggage liability is limited to wearing apparel not to exceed one hundred (\$100) dollars in value for a whole ticket and fifty (\$50) dollars for a half ticket, unless a greater value is declared by the owner, and excess charges paid thereon at the time of taking uassage.

passage. CUSTOMS. Passengers having baggage checked from a point in the United States through Canada to another point in the United States should have same corded and sealed by the U. S. Customs officer before leaving the United States so as to avoid customs examination. Baggage required for use in Canada should not be corded and sealed, but if checked from a point in the United States to a local point in Canada, it will require examination at one of the above ports of enter.

FARES CANNOT BE ADJUSTED BY PURSERS. In event of any disagreement with purser relative to tickets, necessary privileges, etc., passengers should pay purser, take receipt and refer the case to Passenger Traffic Department

for adjustment.

LOST PROPERTY. All articles left on board steamers by passengers are sent to the Passenger Department of the respective divisions at Toronto or Montreal, where they may be recovered by owners on application.

LOST TICKETS. As transportation companies are not responsible for lost tickets, every precaution should be taken for their security. Passengers should make memorandum of destination—by what company issued, form number, consecutive number, place and date of sale, also of the consecutive number of their harpages checks.

their baggage checks.

RESERVATIONS. All telegraph or telephone messages for stateroom reservations must be paid for by sender. Requests for stateroom reservations must be
accompanied by certified check or money order in payment for same.

Each stateroom is arranged for two or three persons. Therefore, in requesting
reservation, it is important to state whether the accommodation desired is for
a lady, gentleman, or family so that passengers may be properly located. Exclusive use of room by one passenger may be obtained only by paying full room
charge and one and one-half passage fares.

No refunds allowed on stateroom tickets. Passengers should claim stateroom
reserved before steamer sails.

STOP-OVER CHECKS will be granted on application to Purser, within limit on first-class tickets. East of Quebec stop-over checks are given for berths but accommodation on succeeding steamers is not guaranteed.

TICKET ARRANGEMENTS, MONTREAL to PRESCOTT. As no rooms are available on Rapids Steamers, passengers will be carried westbound Montreal to Prescott on C.N.R. train. If ticket is held with one coupon routed C.S.L. to a point beyond Brockville, same should be presented at Ticket Office where in exchange ticket with two coupons will be issued reading C.N.R. to Prescott or Brockville, thence C.S.L.

DECK CHAIRS, equipped with comfortable cushions, warm heavy rugs and under the supervision of competent Deck Stewards, are available on all steamers at slight additional cost.

ENTERING CANADA. Visitors from the United States may enter Canada freely and move about with the same informality and ease they experience in their own land. No passports are required of U.S. citizens. However, it will be well for foreign-born members, or those of foreign extraction, to have in their possession birth certificates or any other identification. Citizens of the United States by naturalization should be prepared to present their naturalization certificates, and citizens of other countries should be prepared to establish their legal admission to the United States either by record of admission or certificate

RETURNING TO THE UNITED STATES. The United States Department of State advises that, "The new (United States) regulations impose no additional requirements on United States citizens and they may, as heretofore, proceed to Canada and return to the United States without any specified documentation. They need have only as a matter of convenience the documentary evidence customarily carried in the past." American citizens require no documentation and should have no difficulty, through answers to questions, in satisfying the Examining Immigration Officer. In case they are asked to show papers to establish evidence, the possession of birth or baptismal certificate, voter's certificate, tax bills, letter of identification from a bank manager or responsible municipal official, personal letters, car license, driver's license or similar papers will be helpful.

Resident aliens must have re-entry permit, RETURNING TO THE UNITED STATES. The United States Department Resident aliens must have re-entry permit.

EXCHANGE. A 10% premium—established by law—is paid on American money when exchanged throughout Canada.
