For a time it is true he met with discouragements, but he believed the interests of his constituents demand-

ed the wharf and he kept persistly pressing the matter upon the Government. What is the result? Only a couple of weeks ago he secured the promise of the Minister of Pucilic Works that the docks would be built, and that the pians and specifications would be prepared and tenders asked for immediately.
