Important Events of the past year Recorded by the Bulletin.

Elections, Business, Fires, Accidents, Deaths, Etc.

The following summary is continued from last week:

May 18—Lacrosse schedule prepared.

Lamont's music store had narrow escape from disastrous fire.

Over \$5,000 subscribed to Y. M. C. A. building fund.

Thomas Long presents St. Mary's church with a bell.

Mr. John McLaughlin of Gore Bay succeeds D. McCaig as inspector of Algoma.

Rev. Robert Rodgers, formerly of Collingwood, died in Owen Sound.

Board of Trade endorses proposition providing for the issuing of bonds for \$125,000 in lieu of bonus of \$25,000 to the Elevator Co.

May 25—David Lamont dies unexpectedly.

W. T. Allan won Robertson golf trophy.

Y. M. C. A. purchase site on Third street from Dr. Aylsworth for new building.

Mr. Alex. Heuser resigns agency of the Canadian Express Co., and is succeeded by Mr. E. L. Wright.

Nurses of G. & M. Hospital organize an "Alumni Association. Miss Redmond, president, and Miss Jenkins, secretary.

Department of Marine and Fisheries decides to improve the harbor ranges.

Another grant of \$50,000 included in the estimates for the improvement of this harbor.

June 1—Court of Revision dispose of appeals against assessment.

License of Dominion Hotel transferred to Mr. G. T. Foulis, who agreed to conditions set by License Commissioners in respect to certain financial matters.

Mrs. David Wilson died in G. & M. Hospital.

Turfmen organize and elect W. A. Tom, president.

Major Henry A. Gray of Public Works Department died in Toronto.

Representatives of Department of Marine and Fisheries visit town and make inspection of sites offered for proposed fish hatchery.

June 8—F. F. Telfer won golf handicap.

Graduation exercises at G. & M. Hospital a brilliant function.

William Watts, an old and respected resident, died, aged 78 years.

Dr. John Seath, inspector of High Schools and Collegiate Institutes, expresses dissatisfaction with the Collegiate Institute building.

June 15—Negotiations for the purchase of the Collingwood Shipbuilding Co. by the Canada Shipbuilding Co. reported.

W. S. F. Institute's annual meeting. W. J. Owens re-elected president and Jno. McKee re-elected secretary-treasurer.

The Bryan Mfg. Co. incorporated with capital of \$150,000. F. W. Bryan, president, and W. T. Herrington, secretary-treasurer.

June 22—Presbyterian congregation decide to build extension to their Sunday school.

James Brydon, manager of the Bank of Commerce for seventeen years, is transferred to Toronto. He is succeeded here by Mr. R. W. Crompton.

Steamer City of Collingwood and G.T.R. freight shed burned (June 19). Four men lose their lives in the flames. Loss, \$140,000.

Mr. A. Heuser presented with a purse by the citizens on the occasion of his leaving for the Northwest.

Rev. Dr. Ockley transferred to Barrie and succeeded here by Rev. H. Irvine.

June 29—P. Howard, fishery inspector, is dismissed by the Ontario Government. Succeeded by George Hawkes.

Capt. R. H. Gilbertson died at Beaverton.
