TALE OF THE WRECK

Owen Sound, Nov. 27.—The staunch little coasting steamer J., H. Jones, which for years shas covered the route from Wiarton and this port along the east shore of the Bruce peninsula to the south side of the Manitouiin, has rone to the bottom, carrying with her over a score of human lives. There has been more or less apprehension since last Friday. The Jones left here on Thursday. The Jones left here on Thursday, and was not reported at various points of call up the lake.
