New England has its Joseph Lincoln; the Mississippi, its Mark Twain; the Southwest, its Zane Grey and Helen Hunt Jackson; Alaska, its Rex Beach and Jack London. Their pens painted scenes and created characters that will remain a part of our American heritage, but where is the writer who has done justice to the men of the Great Lakes and the ships they conceived, built, and sailed?

Perhaps they are with us today, but lack a knowledge of those ships sufficient unto their needs. Let us hope they come upon the Nautical Exhibit now at the Detroit Historical Museur, for there they will find the stage for their characters, corplete in every detail, done to the last rope, block, and belaying pin.

Mémbers of the Guild, whose work is on display there may have built better than they know, and in doing so may have supplied just what is needed to spark a whole new literature, and one sorely needed to complete the story of our country.

If you know a potential novelist, invite him to see these model ships. We have something to offer them, and a real good book on the Lakes can do us a lot of good. Dana Bowen is doing a good job with facts, but we also need a fiction writer in this field, or better still, a historical novelist. Meanwhile let us build more and still better ships.

RECENT ARRIVAL

The three-mast schooner, "Lucia Simpson", from Dunallen, New Jersey; Dr. O. H. Siegmund, builder. Here is a real fine piece of work and one that shows one more type of Great Lakes vessel that will help tell the story of commercial shipping on these waters. The model was flown in a case especially designed for the transporation of such fragile objects, and she came through without damage.

MINUTES OF THE FEBRUARY MEETING

7:45 P.M. February 27, 1953, meeting called to order in the Briefing Room of the Detroit Historical Museum by Pres. Robt. L. Ruhl. Capt. Johnston rendered an account of the funds derived from the last model contest for the period of September 26, 1952 to Feb. 27, 1953:

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Funds on hand Sept. 27, 1952.....\$133.00.

Vouchers covering the above were presented and all transactions approved by unaminous vote.

In the sence of the Secretary-Treasurer, no report on membership was available.

The matter of replacing Vice Pres. Priestley was taken u and after debate it was suggested that Mr. R. H. Davison be elevated to that office, so he could work on promotion with Capt. Johnston. Edgar Hopusch was chosen to fill the office of Secretary-Treasurer, and accepted. There being no other nominations, Mr. Hopusch was declared elected Sec.-Treasurer

Mr. Robert Cords announced that his mother, Mrs. M. Cords had volunteered to make up the flag recently adopted by the Guild. Capt. Johnston stated that he would see that the necessary material for the flag were made available.

Mr. John F. Miller suggested that the Guild show the film on Gloucester shipbuilding. The suggestion was approved, provided a projector could be obtained.

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Capt. Johnston asked for a schedule of prices for the Guild Stationery for use by Guild members. It was decided that 30¢ be charged for 10 letter heads and 10 envelopes, which would just about cover the cost with a few cents left to cover loss or damage in handling. The meeting was adjourned at 8:35 1.M. and the members toured the museum until closing time, with most of the time being spent in the Nautical Exhibit which is jointly sponsored by the Museum of Great Lakes History and the Guild.

A VISITING MODEL BUILDER

Captain H. C. Inches, of Westlake, Ohio, spent Wednesday, March 11, with Capt. Johnston on the Museum ship "J.T.Wing", and at the Detroit Historical Museum, inspecting models that have been built by Guild members; with a brief visit to the Burton Historical Collection.

Capt. Inches, besides being an active ship master on the Great Lakes, is a well-known model builder, and a marine historian of repute. His collection of fine photographs, which he brought with him, is known all over the Great Lakes area. In the course of his visit, he offered a number of very valuable suggestions, based upon his considerable experience as a builder, and half a century of sailing the Lakes. His knowledge of details of Lakes sail and steam vessels rakes himtone of the best-qualified model builders in this field. As a member of the Guild he would be a tremendous asset, but feels that his distance from Detroit is too great for satisfactory participation. However, he offers his cooperation.
